DID YOU KNOW?

Although there are 39 possible bridge hand combinations, the number of different possible bridge hands is 635,013,559.600.

Percentage of Card Division between two hidden hands. (a guide only)

Cards out 2 cards -	1-1 52%: 2-0 48%:
3 cards -	2-1 78%: 3-0 22%:
4 cards -	2-2 40%: 3-1 50%: 4-0 10%:
5 cards -	3-2 68%: 4-1 28%: 5-6 4%:
6 cards -	3-3 35%: 4-2 49%: 5-1 15%: 6-0 2%
7 cards -	4-3 62%: 5-2 30%: 6-1 7%: 7-0 0.5%

Except for 2 cards, the general rule is even cards probably do not split evenly, and odd cards probably do split as evenly as possible.
